WI Snapshot: John Hilton Pigott, 1895-1941

John Hilton Pigott was born in Shallotte on Nov. 12, 1895. He was called to duty and inducted into the U.S. Army on July 22, 1918, and trained at Camp Hancock, Ga., according to local board military records.

Pvt. Pigott served with the 45th Machine Gun Battalion of the 15th Division. The men

were undergoing intensive training at Camp Logan, Texas, when the war ended. He was honorably discharged on Jan. 29, 1919.

Pigott's life came to a tragic end when he was involved in an automobile accident near Fort Bragg. His death certificate shows that several complications caused his death. On Dec. 19, 1940, he had open-reduction surgery on his fractured left leg. Ten days before his death, he suffered from influenza, then ultimately lost his life from a coronary occlusion. His obituary is shown below.

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


in WWI and have been featured on the website and in the Beacon for nearly three years.
